

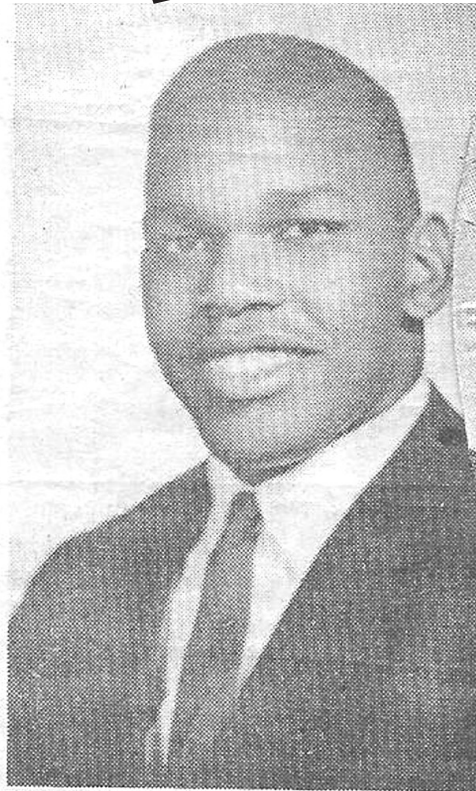
# Remembering Bill Day

His hobby is making friends.

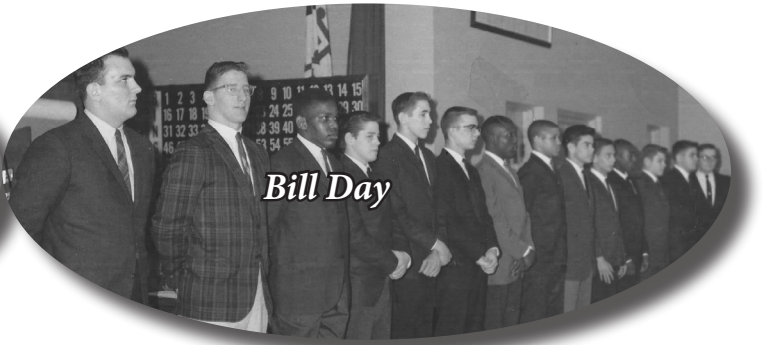
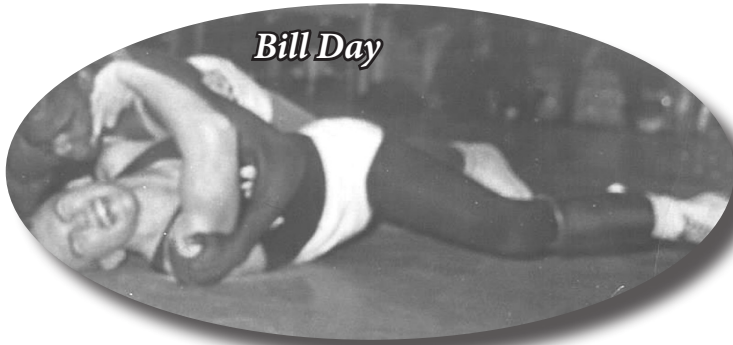
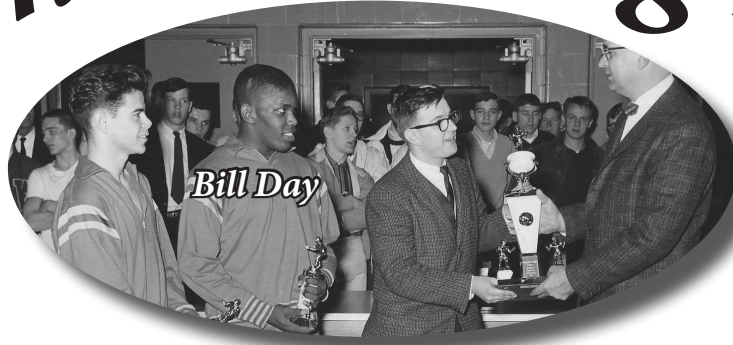
